STORY:

Pedro Almodovar's critically acclaimed black comedy, WHAT HAVE I DONE TO DESERVE THIS!, reminiscent of Bunuel's dark comedies, is an hilarious, irreverent, absurdist farce about working class family life in modern-day Madrid.

Gloria (Carmen Maura), the heroine, lives in a small apartment in one of the low-income housing projects that ring Madrid. She is addicted to "speed" to get her through her 18-hour days. Her 14-year-old-son sells heroin so that he can take his grandmother back to the country; her 12-year-old son seems to enjoy sexual relations with older men, so Gloria sells him to a homosexual dentist; her loutish husband is an illiterate taxi driver who somehow once forged, and published, Hitler's letters to a mistress.

Gloria's impulses go every which way and there's probably never been a zanier treatment of the breakdown of the family and the decay of society.
