Hench, English subtities (New Yorker Films). 60 mins Vieyra in Le Cinema Africain (Editions Présence Africaine, Paris, 1975) terms LA NOIRE DE... the first feature-length film made by an African -Schara and as a first feature (Semebene's fourth film) it is as A.H. Weiler reviews it in The New York Times (1/3/69) . "sharp...bright...neat". He writes that LE NOILE DE... "bears the quiet distinctions of simplicity, sincerity and subdued anger toward the freed black man's new burdens, problems that are more revealing and moving than exotic ... Vacationing in Antibes is in the kitchen, bedroom, bathroom and dining room. 'I'm only a slave', the off-screen voice intones, translating her inner anguish, a desperation ... But while the mistress is demanding, her hus and is no slave dirver but a gent who is confused but considerate ... The villains here appear to be the changing societies, the native class dominated by poverty and unemployment and the seeming French apathy toward their former dependents' demand for dignity.

Vieyra also reports LA NOINE DE... was more than less shot in the order in which it was cut, and that a somethat longer version once existed with a color sequence of Diouana's voyage from Marseilles to Antibes. (She did indeed find France beautiful). The actress who plays Diouana, Therese M'Bissa Diop worked as a dressmaker before appearing in this film (she is also in EMITAI); her voice, however, is dubbed by Toto Bissainthe. Because there no studio for post-synchronization in Dakar thme of the cast had to be flown to Paris for dubbed at a cost which added 50% to the fueget of the film.
