

SYNOPSIS:

Valmont and Juliette de Merteuil are man and wife, rich and respected members of glittering French society. Both in their thirties, they enjoy a mutual pact of sexual freedom and total truth. Juliette is planning to leave her American lover but when she hears that he is planning to propose marriage to young Cecile Volanges, she decides to have her revenge. She hatches a plot and expects her diplomat husband to help her carry it out-since Valmont is, first and foremost, Juliette's accomplice. They live a happy life in which they observe no rules but to enjoy themselves.

At Megeve, Valmont accedes to Juliette's request that he seduce Cecile. Meanwhile, he meets Marianne, a virtuous young woman, happily married, with whom he falls deeply in love. Sensing danger, Marianne returns to Paris. Valmont now makes Cecile his mistress. He swears to his wife that he will seduce Marianne and then abandon her at once, in an effort to convince his

wife that he is not really in love with Marianne.

In Paris, he quickly gains his ends. But, instead of keeping the promise he made to his wife, he goes off with Marianne. For once, Juliette feels herself threatened, manages to get Valmont back to Paris, and forces him to send a telegram to Marianne breaking off the relationship. Juliette then informs Danceny, a student madly in love with Cecile, of Cecile's escapade wth Valmont. This results in a tragic end for Valmont. Juliette is disfigured when she tries to burn the incriminating letters on their lives.

Background to the film: 180 years after the publication of "Les Liaisons Danaereuses," the first daring best seller in French literature, Choderlos De Laclos's

characters are now let loose in present-day Paris.

WOMAN'S DESIRE FOR FREEDOM TO LOVE **EXPLORED IN "DANGEROUS LOVE AFFAIRS"**

With his "Dangerous Love Affairs" (Les Liaisons Dangereuses), Roger Vadim has eclipsed even the notoriety which accompanied the series of films in which he directed his former wife, Brigitte Bardot. His latest film was a cause celebre in France even before it hit Paris screens, following a series of delays while the French government weighed the advisability of permitting its release. It has for more than a year been denied an export license for American showings until Astor Pictures finally won permission to release the controversial film, which opens at Theatre beginning

Adapted from the famed 18th century novel of the same name by Choderlos de Laclos, but in modern dress and settings, "Dangerous Love Affairs" is the story of a French diplomat and his wife, monied and respected, whose mutual pact of sexual freedom embraces even their helping each other plan their

extra-marital affairs.

What interested Vadim most was to show the conflicts between society and the liberty of the individual, mainly through women. He had, in "And God Created Woman," presented an 18-year-old girl, pure though sensual, who was trying to emancipate herself on a physical and moral plane, faced by the taboos imposed by her stratum of society. In "Dangerous Love Affairs," it is a woman of thirty who is in conflict with other taboos imposed by the upper class milieu in which she lives.

Vadim points out that the woman in "Dangerous Love Affairs," played by Jeanne Moreau, is beautiful, wealthy and apparently free. But this is not true, since her social obligations force her to hide her so-called liberty. Though her husband, played by Gerard Philipe, can be open about the affairs he embraces, she must conceal her own. This lack of true liberty engenders a need for power over others and, since she is thwarted in this urge, she needs to find a means of wielding this power. This she manages through the complicty of her husband.

Vadim has said that the aspect of the book which most attracted him to filming his adaptation of "Les Liaisons Dangereuses" is that, in helping arrange affairs for each other, the diplomat and his wife plot them as if they were actually military generals. Vadim found himself fascinated by this extraordinary analysis of the mechanism of love and, in his film, shows the weaknesses of the husband and wife when the husband truly finds love in one of the "campaigns." This begins to destroy the relationship of the married couple and leads to their mutual destruction.

SHORTS:

Roger Vadim's controversial "Dangerous Love Affairs" (Les Liaisons Dangereuses), opening at the Theatre is rapidly closing in on the all-time boxoffice champions in France and was seen by more than one million people in its first-run engagement in Paris alone.

The popularity of the film closely parallels the success of the novel by Choderlos de Laclos, upon which it was based. The book was published 180 years ago, was the sensation of France and became the first daring best-seller in French literature.

The film version, which director Vadim updated, stars Jeanne Moreau and Gerard Philipe. The film is being released by Astor Pictures.

French critics and film-goers have tabbed Annette Stroyberg Vadim "another Brigitte Bardot" and audiences here will have a chance to decide for themselves when Roger Vadim's controversial "Dangerous Love Affairs" (Les Liasons Dangereuses) opens at the Theatre.

A former model, the Danish-born Annette Stroyberg Vadim, like Bardot was at one time married to Roger Vadim, who launched both girls on their film careers.

"DANGEROUS LOVE AFFAIRS" WITTY AND PROVOCATIVE

(Prepared Review)

(Running Time: 106 Minutes)

Roger Vadim's "Dangerous Love Affairs" (Les Liaisons Dangereuses), which opened yesterday at the Theatre, is a provocative and typically French look at a segment of society without spiritual values. It is also a saucy and entertaining film that is going to be talked about for many months.

The picture already has created a sensation and controversy in France, where the DeGaulle Government, perhaps stung by Vadim's satirical film portrait of a French diplomat, forbade its export for a year and a half. While the film is a tongue-in-cheek look at immoral people and immoral deeds, it remains, however, essentially moral in its viewpoint.

As one might expect, when Vadim looks at love and morals, there are shocking elements, but because the director's approach is tasteful and moral, only the ultra-sensitive or completely humorless person will be offended. The film must rank as the best to date from Vadim, who also directed "And God Created Woman," starring his discovery and ex-wife Brigitte Bardot.

"Dangerous Love Affairs" tells the story of a wealthy and handsome roque, who happens to be a French diplomat, and his wife. The couple agrees to grant each other complete freedom. In fact, they even help to plan extra-marital affairs and then report them to each other in detail.

Jeanne Moreau, as the wife, proves once again that she is one of the most versatile and talented personalities on the international film scene.

Gerard Philipe is completely captivating as the diplomat, who uses a rakish charm and continental polish to captivate the women in his life. And there are very many women in this roque's life!

Annette Stroyberg Vadim, who like Bardot is a Vadim protege and his ex-wife, plays Marianne, a young married woman who struggles to retain her virtue in the face of Philipe's elaborate campaign of seduction. Annette serves notice that she is ready to challenge Bardot in the glamour department and she can act as well. Mark this young lady down as a star of the future.

Another attractive newcomer is young Jeanne Valerie who plays a precocious school girl who finds herself involved in love affairs with three different men at once.

Another plus factor is a captivating jazz score by Thelonious Monk and Jack Murray. which manages to underscore each subtle change of mood taken by the film.

Vadim's tasteful direction keeps the film from becoming bawdy and his camerawork is a joy to the eye. Above all, because he has endowed his film with wit and sensitivity, we may be shocked or we may laugh at what his characters are doing, but we never condone their immorality. He has succeeded in exposing the unattractiveness of evil without ever preaching.

While "Dangerous Love Affairs" is not a film for the immature, it is highly recommended film entertainment for adults, who may well leave the theatre exclaiming: "How French can they get!"
