Sorrento — "Asa Branca" is a vacuous realization of the teenage dream to reach soccer stardom. A wholesome, provincial, adolescent jock strong-arms his way to fame through endless sacrifice and moral corruption.

In this dripping saga, Antonio Dos Reis (Edson Celulari) switches his name to Asa Branca (white wings) and abandons home and friends to fulfill the role of angel at dismal local carnivals. He sells his soul to a succession of corrupt soccer club owners and intolerant, servile coaches.

Lonely and confused, he heads to the big city to have his innocence tempted and (mildly) tarnished. The happy ending is a kitschy special effects ascension to immortality.

This wholly predictable pic is tiresome and mediocre at best. Acting is improbable even to teen idol worshipers or sport fans. Shoddy soccer footage and poor lensing and soundtrack further decrease audience chances. —Chin.
