Charles Chaplin wrote and directed A Woman in Paris in 1923. It was well received by critics and the intellectual community, but the public was not able to accept its beloved Little Tramp in a different role. Chaplin eventually withdrew it from circulation. But in 1976, Sir Charles Chaplin composed a new musical score for this classic, and made new prints from his original negative. It is no longer a lost film.

In his original program notes, Chaplin wrote: "In my first serious drama, A Woman of Paris, I've striven for realism. What you will see is life as I personally see it—the beauty—the sadness—the touches—the gaiety, all of which are necessary to make life interesting. The story is intimate, simple and human, presenting a problem as old as the ages—showing it with as much truth as I am allowed to put into it—giving a treatment as near realism as I have been able to devise."—Susan Lilly
