The Film

The 42-year-old Kata, a divorced, childless factory worker, wants a child by her occasional lover Goska; he, however, being happily married, refuses for fear of repercussions. The teenager Anna Bálint has been in state care since childhood, and seeks a way out so that she can marry her boyfriend Sanyi. When their paths chance to cross, these two women begin a relationship that promises to fulfil both their needs: a probationary adoption is arranged. Anna becomes the daughter Kata has never had (although Kata continues to hanker for a baby), while Anna herself finds both a way to get closer to her boyfriend and to bring her prospects of marriage nearer.

Comment

Adoption returns to the worlds of Mészáros' first two features: the Erzebet of *The Girl* is enlarged into two personalities, 42-year-old Kata, a divorced, childless factory worker, a loner desirous of a child by her comfortably married lover (who adamantly refuses for fear of future repercussions), and the teenage Anna Bálint, in state care since childhood and looking for a way out in order to marry her boyfriend Sanyi. The changing relationship between these two women of different generations and outlooks forms the core of the film: both, in their varying ways, are seeking emotional stability and orientation, since both have for a long time led solitary lives with few attachments (either sought or permitted). The meeting of these two souls is imbued with more than a touch of inevitability: Mészáros' roaming camera, and the script's rejection of unnecessary dialogue, creates a powerful sense of the two being drawn together by a force neither fully comprehends...

Adoption is Meszaros' most accomplished work to date: the visual style is invitingly fluid, the passion residing in the camera and the eyes of the protagonists (Anna's wedding reception viewed through the faces of her institution friends; the touching night-time reunion of Kata and her lover Goska).

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MÉSZÁROS Márta

was born in Budapest, 19 September 1931. Her family was forced to evacuate to the USSR in 1936, and she was raised and educated there. After a brief return to Hungary in 1946, she entered the VGIK film school in Moscow (where she married her first husband, a Romanian), and then went on to work on newsreels and short documentaries in Budapest and Bucharest. In 1959, after divorcing, she settled in Budapest working as director of numerous short films and documentaries. She joined Mafilm Group 4 in the mid-1960s, and made her first feature for the studio in 1968. There she met Jancsó Miklós, who became her second husband soon after. Adoption, her fifth feature, won her the Grand Prix at Berlin in 1975, and her subsequent films have won numerous further international awards. Her most recent film, the French-Hungarian co-production The Inheritors, was the official Hungarian entry at Cannes in 1980.
