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

STORY

The film is episodic in structure and is roughly divided into the following sections:

- 1. The coronation of Ivan Alexieff, Ivan IV, the Moscow Tzar.
- 2. The wedding feast of Tzar Ivan and Tzaritza Anastasia, interrupted by a peasant insurrection and the visit of the Kazan ambassadors.
 - 3. The storming of Kazan.
- 4. Ivan's illness and the treachery of the Boyars (the Russian feudal nobility, opposed to an absolute ruler).
 - 5. The dispatching of the ambassador to England and the poisoning of Anastasia.
 - 6. Ivan's decision for abdication at his wife's bier.
 - 7. His recall at Alexandrov by a great petition of the Russian people.
